LDC History

As a 6 year volunteer at the Connecticut LDC (Literature Distribution Center) I found that many Al-Anon members had limited knowledge about the facility and its history. In that District 8 was asked to submit articles to the *Lifeline* this month I thought this was a great opportunity to share some of the information about the LDC.

In 2005 the Long Range Planning committee facilitated the opening of the LDC at the South Congregational Church, 277 Main Street in Hartford, where our spring and fall assemblies have been held for the past 5 years. Prior to that time assemblies were rotated in different facilities across the state depending on which district was hosting the meeting.

The LDC office is located in the basement of the church. Throughout the US many areas (states) have LDC's. Many are like ours with volunteer managers who are given a lunch stipend and gas mileage. Others like in Massachusetts have an LDC that has had the same manager for 20+ years. She is paid a salary and the LDC is subsidized (money given from the Area budget) by the Massachusetts Area.

Until the opening of our LDC, members in CT were ordering literature from WSO in Virginia Beach or from the Massachusetts LDC because the turn around time was quicker. The CT area (AWSC = Area World Service Committee) gave the LDC \$5,500 back in 2005 to start its checking account. Since that time the office has operated in the black with no further money given from the area. The LDC is also not included in the area budget.

The office opened with 2 volunteer managers and a Finance Committee consisting of a Finance Chair/ Treasurer, area treasurer, the 2 managers and 2 other Al-Anon members with business experience. Bank accounts and vendor accounts were set up and the doors opened for business.

Over time, policies and procedures were set up, additional equipment purchased and the management structure changed to 1 manager and an assistant manager. Members of the fellowship with financial and business consulting backgrounds were asked to provide their input as to best business practices. The Manager and Assistant Manager were not part of the CT Area Committee (AWSC) such as Public Out Reach, Schedules, Alateen, etc.

While the LDC sells Al-Anon literature it has operated as a business not as an Al-Anon Committee or other service model. In doing so shrinkage, poor accounting practice and other problems that are the demise of small businesses have been avoided. Because the LDC is a nonprofit, the operating fund balance while not large is in line with what is acceptable for a non-profit organization in CT.

Beginning last October the Board of Directors (BOD) working along with the LDC Manager and Assistant Manager, who had served 6 years and 4 years respectively, and the Finance Committee began the transition process to a new Manager and Assistant manager.

The Finance Committee provided the Board of Directors with an extensive transition plan to facilitate a smooth changeover to a new Manager, Assistant manager, and finance committee chair in addition to 2 new members of the finance committee. A new Manager and Assistant manager are now in place.

As I write this article an announcement was recently released by the BOD stating that the LDC is open for filling orders by mail and the office will reopen for walk-ins 8/27/13.

We Are Never Alone

My name is Sandy and I am the GR of the 7 PM Newtown Group. I had to write regarding my incredible experience at the Al-Anon International Convention in Vancouver this past July.



This story started on December 14, 2012; as we all know an unspeakable tragedy took place that day. It still lives with us. By experiencing what I feel was Crosstalk at this meeting; I realize why I felt so uncomfortable. I come to Al-Anon (5)
